# **Enhancing the 'Four Cs' Across Educational Stages**

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS): At this foundational level, emphasis is placed on play-based learning to nurture creativity and collaboration. Activities such as group storytelling and imaginative play encourage communication skills, while simple problem-solving tasks lay the groundwork for critical thinking.

**Key Stage One:** Building upon early foundations, students engage in structured group projects to enhance collaboration. Class discussions and show-and-tell sessions promote effective communication. Introducing puzzles and basic reasoning exercises further develops critical thinking abilities.

**Key Stage Two:** At this stage, students undertake more complex collaborative projects, fostering teamwork and creative problem-solving. Debates and presentations are incorporated to refine communication skills. Engaging in experiments and inquiry-based learning strengthens critical thinking and creativity.

**Key Stage Three**: Students participate in interdisciplinary projects that require advanced collaboration and creative solutions. Opportunities for public speaking and collaborative digital projects enhance communication skills. Critical analysis of texts and real-world scenarios further sharpens critical thinking.

**Young Adult Stage:** Preparing for higher education and the workforce, students engage in internships and community projects that demand high-level collaboration and communication. Creative endeavors such as entrepreneurship programs are encouraged. Advanced critical thinking is developed through research projects and ethical debates.
